

CARLS LOOP ANTENNA

My first introduction to the loop antenna was a gift from John WA2FUZ (SK). He was moving from the area and I had helped him remove some of his towers. He handed me a bunch of wire with a few insulators. He said it was 537 ft (160 meters) long and that I would be very happy with it. Dave, WD2K (SK) had raved about his loop antenna and I thought yeah, yeah. I finally tried it, hanging the feed point from my tower-about 55 ft high. I just fed it with RG-8 cable, no matching, just a circle of #14 insulated electrical wire with one end connected to the center conductor of the coax, the other end to the shield. I connected the center conductor of the coax to the wire, raised it on the tower, then snaked the wire through the trees on my property, using nylon string to hold the wire about 10-15 feet off the ground. After running the wire through the trees, I pulled it up and soldered it to the shield. I tried listening with the new antenna, it seemed to work as poorly as I imagined. My S-5 background noise was S-3 or lower. I Thought, well if you short the receiver input ,what do you expect? I tuned around found a signal on 75 meter fone. It was about S-9, the same reading as on the dipole, but the background noise was way down. The antenna loaded fine on all bands 80-10, and has worked well. I thought if it works this well at these heights, I'll raise it. I shot arrows over tree branches 40ft or more high and pulled the antenna higher-the result was the cloud warmer antenna I thought the initial loop would be. The feed point high, with maybe 60 feet of it high, then the rest 10-20 feet high seems to work best. I heartily recommend the loop antenna, even though members of the dipole coalition might take exception. I have had little luck with this or any other antenna on 160 meters. Carl, WB2TCV

We enjoy a freedom of the world that few others will ever know and yet we are told that we should "dumb down" our hobby so "the numbers" will continue to grow. What we have is too special to lose to the "numbers". The decision must be made that it is this uniqueness that makes the hobby what it is. If we lose it let's lose it because we demanded our right to be different. If we don't do this we will lose what we have anyway.

You Can Enjoy Contests Even If You're Not a Contester

I often talk to guys who say that they're not contesters. Some even go so far as to say that they hate contests. I'm really not a contester, either, but I do enjoy operating them from time to time. There are several ways to enjoy amateur radio contests even if you're not a "contester."

This weekend, for example, the CQ World-Wide (CQWW) SSB DX contest was being held. As usual for a Saturday morning, I w a s d o w n a t W A 2 H O M (www.wa2hom.org), our club station at the Ann Arbor Hands-On Museum (www.aahom.org). Now, the museum is only open from 10am - 5pm on Saturdays, so there's no way I'm going to score very highly in the contest, but I still decided to participate.

What I did was take advantage of the contest activity to add countries to our DXCC list. Over two hours of operation, I managed to make 63 contacts, including at least five new countries. The new countries that I added to our log included Iceland, Northern Ireland, Scotland, the Cayman Islands, and Madeira Island.

None of these is rare DX, but for whatever reason, we hadn't worked them before. Now, we have. In addition, some of the big contesters will travel to exotic locales and operate from places that normally have no or few ham radio operators. Contests are good opportunities to get those countries in your log.

Operating in a contest is also a good test of your radio and antennas. It's true that contest signal reports are basically meaningless, but if DX stations regularly hear you on your first or second call, then chances are your antennas are working well. If they're continually asking for repeats or never hear you at all, it's a good bet that you need to do some antenna work.

Working a contest can also improve your operating skills. In a CW contest, for example, the good ops are generally operating at 25+ words per minute. That's OK,

though, because it forces you to copy that fast, and because you know what the exchange format is, you pretty much know what characters to expect. Try it sometime. You'll be surprised at how fast you can copy during a contest and how much your CW speed improves.

If none of the above reasons convince you, and you're still a bit apprehensive about jumping into one of the bigger contests, let me suggest that you try one of the smaller contests. State QSO parties, for example, are a lot more laid back than say the ARRL Sweepstakes. The CW speeds are a lot lower and the phone contacts are a lot less intense. You may even learn something about a particular state's geography. You will for sure learn a lot of county names.

It's all about having fun. And you can have fun in a contest, even if you don't have the time or the equipment to be competitive.

Yaesu's Amateur Radio Division Breaks with Motorola, Changes Name to Yaesu Musen

After four years under the Motorola umbrella, Yaesu has split from that company. According to Vertex Standard President and Chief Executive Officer Jun Hasegawa, effective January1, 2012, Motorola will keep the Vertex Standard Land-Mobile Division, while the amateur, marine and air-band will be under the Yaesu Musen banner. The new company will be known as Yaesu USA here in the US.

"This reorganization will allow us to concentrate in amateur, marine and airband business, which will better leverage and align the strengths of our entire business operation," Hasegawa said in a press release dated December 27. "We believe that there is an exciting opportunity to evolve our organization to meet the needs of the Amateur Radio, Marine equipment and air band telecommunication industries by continuing to provide specialized services and the highest quality products."

Hasegawa explained that the new company's name will be Yaesu Musen, "a name our business partners have been familiar with for over 50 years. We are delighted to bring you the legacy of trust, quality and solid customer service that has always been associated with the Yaesu Musen company name."

While Yaesu Musen will have a new Japanese address, the address and phone numbers -- as well as the US operations and sales organization -- for Yaesu USA will not change. Dennis Motschenbacher, K7BV, will remain in charge of Yaesu USA's sales division.
