



Your dues are important to this club! We support the operation of the repeater at between 700 and 800 dollars per year just in electric bills. We are always upgrading and improving and maintaining the system. Some of this expense is covered by our members. Our insurance is \$320 per year. Food alone for Field Day and the picnic is over \$300. We purchase some kind of snack for each meeting at probably around an average of \$15 per month and about another \$100 plus for the goody fest. Other than dues our income is sparse. The only substantial income has been the fall tag sale and the goods to sell are running out. The income from the raffle is not a lot. Our paid roster so far in 2015 is only 26 members paid. About \$600 income from dues so far. A rough estimate is about \$1600 expense and about \$600 income leaving us in the hole for \$1000. At the current rate we will be broke in two years! I know that several more members will pay their dues soon, but if you could pay sooner it would make it easier to plan. These figures are obviously a rough estimate but i think you can all see the potential dilemma looming. Please consider helping to maintain your club. Not only dues but your attendance at the meetings and your donations toward the fall tag sale and other needed support.

#### **NEW ANTENNA** I recently purchased a multi band non reso-

nant vertical antenna. it is: 43 ft aluminum interlocking via clamps..the included manual is self directive...easy 'project'..i had my brother help me raise it..by keeping his foot on the butt bottom tube..the thickest...and holding onto the radial ropes(2) that i had for 'tiedown'...3 is better,.i know..i used what i had at the moment. the antenna comes with a steel plate(included) for anchoring on a 1 1/2-2 inch pipe...which i had already in use on my old 4btv..which i took down..so this antenna can be used in it's place...i already had put a counterpoise of aluminum siding approximate 10 ft. x 10 ft., with the 2 inch mastpipe buried deep...and about 2 1/2-3 ft. above the ground level...i also put many many radial's of all length's for all band use..80-10 M..and a few 160 mtr rads.to boot...i tried this antenna asap when it arrived to my qth..i did not at the time..acquire the useful 4:1 balun..the antenna normally use's..it is hard to tune without this balun...though i had a 1:1 swr on the 60 mtr band from 'jumpstreet';)..it is really a 5/8 wave for 20 mtr...originally...anyway: i purchased the needed 4:1 balun from same source:dx engineering.com..the balun arrived today..i hurriedly excitedly rushed out and put the balun on the antenna as instruction's directed..i quickly gave the antenna a bands 'test'..i have several auto tuners...but unfortunately, for me..no kenwood ts440s external tuner...so i used my old(fairly new,really) mfj-902b travel tuner..i 'noticed' a bit of loss on 60 mtr..but tuner corrected that good..i tried 80m,40 m,17 m,15m,12m,10 m..all tuned well...sadly..my rig is lacking 20 and 30 m...also the tuner will not tune on 160 m..so that is not tested as yet. overall.. i am quite happy to have this new multi band vertical in my backyard antenna farm hi.at this time, my hf antenna's are: a-99 gp,dx-b trap 160/80/40/30 m, and this multi vertical;) my 75 mtr dipole broke a pole from severe wind cndx recenty..it was Not very high..and was very hard to 'tune'..so i do Not really 'miss it'..this multi was for replacement...and it tunes and 'works' for me...yes, verticals are good dx, but 'noisy'...i do Not have much 'noise problems' that i am aware of...i do hope to acquire a seperate reciever for hf as well as a seperate recieveing antenna...with a seperate' switchbox' for operating While tx/rx..hopefully./.the 'noise problem'

will go away, for me hi. i live in west coxsackie...so line noise..and other rfi are a tolerable situation. Anyway Stan..this is what's 'new' at my shack..i hope to work you and our club member's in the near future on the hf bands..i usaully cw or digital...though i do ssb (voice) on 60 mtr 5 ch. ocassionally. all the best gl dx and 73ke2eb george.

## **PLEASE COME TO YOUR CLUB MEETINGS.**

### **WE NEED YOU!**

#### Directions from the north to Churchtown firehouse...

Take exit 12 off of I90 onto route 9 south. Travel 4.6 miles to the traffic circle and take the first right out of the circle (not the mall) onto route 9H. About 11.5 miles you will come to a traffic light intersection of 9H and route 66. Go straight through that light for about 3.6 miles to the next traffic light at 9H and route 23. Again go straight through that light for about 1.1 miles to a left turn off of 9H onto County Route 27. It is marked. Stay on route 27 for about 2.5 miles and the Firehouse is on the right with a sign out front. Park in the lot just before the building.

## Firehouse from RVW Bridge and

From the intersection of 9G and Route 23 take 23 about 2.7 miles to the traffic light at the intersection of Route 9. Go straight through the traffic light and travel about 2.7 miles on route 9 to the next traffic light at the intersection of 9H and 82. Turn left at that light onto Route 9H about 2.8 miles to County 27. Stay on route 27 for about 2.5 miles and the Firehouse is on the right with a sign out front. Park in the lot just before the building.



A couple of weeks ago, I made my annual pilgrimage to Dayton for the 2015 Hamvention. This year, I had even more fun than in the past, and that's saying a lot.

I started Dayton 2015 on Thursday by attending the QRP-ARCI's Four Days in May (http://www.qrparci.org/fdim/) seminar. George Dobbs, G3RJV, gave a very nice talk that not only talked about circuits, but also the people he's met over the years and the places he's been. Paul, MOXPD, gave an interesting talk on crystal filters and using an Arduino to control a QRP rig. The final talk, by Glen, KW5GP, was also about using an Arduino to control a QRP rig. Other talks covered transmission lines and SWR and adventures in PCB making. I learned something in every single one.

That evening, I participated in Vendor's Night. I sold quite a few copies of my CW Geek's Guide to Having Fun with Morse Code and gave out quite a few "I'm a CW Geek" buttons and "Hams Obey Ohm's Law" stickers.

Friday and Saturday were all about the Hamvention. As far as new products go, there were a couple of interesting announcements. Elecraft introduced the K3S, an updated and upgraded K3 HF Transceiver, and FlexRadio introduced the Maestro, a "front end" with knobs, dials, and LCD screen for their software-driven radios. Apparently, hams like knobs and dials after all.



I also found a Hallicrafters HA-1 T.O. Keyer (http://www.ai4fr.com/ main/page\_ham\_radio\_hallicrafters\_hal.html), which I believe to be the first commercially-available electronic keyer. Produced in the 1960s, it uses tubes to generate dots and dashes.

Dayton usually has a great lineup of forums, but aside from perhaps the TAPR forum, the Antennas forum, and maybe the ATV forum, none of them really called to me. Also, I was really busy talking to people I know, meeting readers, and trying to get the dealers to carry my books, so I didn't get to a single one.

## What is Field Day?



ARRL Field Day is the single most popular on-the-air event held annually in the US and Canada. On the fourth weekend of June of each year, more than 35,000 radio amateurs gather with their clubs, groups or simply with friends to operate from remote locations.

Field Day is a picnic, a campout, practice for emergencies, an informal contest and, most of all, FUN!

It is a time where many aspects of Amateur Radio come together to highlight our many roles. While some will treat it as a contest, other groups use the opportunity to practice their emergency response capabilities. It is an excellent opportunity to demonstrate Amateur Radio to the organizations that Amateur Radio might serve in an emergency, as well as the general public. For many clubs, ARRL Field Day is one of the highlights of their annual calendar.

The contest part is simply to contact as many other stations as possible and to learn to operate our radio gear in abnormal situations and less than optimal conditions.

We use these same skills when we help with events such as marathons and bike-a-thons; fund-raisers such as walk-a-thons; celebrations such as parades; and exhibits at fairs, malls and museums — these are all large, preplanned, non-emergency activities.

But despite the development of very complex, modern communications systems — or maybe because they ARE so complex — ham radio has been called into action again and again to provide communications in crises when it really matters. Amateur Radio people (also called "hams") are well known for our communications support in real disaster and post-disaster situations.

#### What is the ARRL?

The American Radio Relay League is the 150,000+ member national association for Amateur Radio in the USA. ARRL is the primary source of information about what is going on in ham radio. It provides books, news, support and information for individuals and clubs, special events, continuing education classes and other benefits for its members.

#### What is Amateur Radio

Often called "ham radio," the Amateur Radio Service has been around for a century. In that time, it's grown into a worldwide community of licensed operators using the airwaves with every conceivable means of communications technology. Its people range in age from youngsters to grandparents. Even rocket scientists and a rock star or two are in the ham ranks. Most, however, are just normal folks like you and me who enjoy learning and being able to transmit voice, data and pictures through the air to unusual places, both near and far, without depending on commercial systems.

The Amateur Radio frequencies are the last remaining place in the usable radio spectrum where you as an individual can develop and experiment with wireless communications. Hams not only can make and modify their equipment, but can create whole new ways to do things.
