We have had two very successful Tag Sales so far and look forward to more, we just need people to commit to bring lots of stuff.


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# QNZ de K2WG...

Somewhere in my recollections of TV programs from yesteryear, I seem to remember reference to a "Way-Back" machine. So, for this installment of QNZ, let's tune the "Way-Back" machine to the 1960's. Three hams who are students at Chatham High School approach the head of the science department about forming a club. This teacher knew a little about ham radio so it didn't take too much to convince him of the value of forming the club as an extension of the science program. A portion of a science wing storage closet was turned into a ham shack and the quest for equipment and additional members was on.

More members was the easy part, equipment was another story. The 'elmers' in the Chatham area did all they could, some extra equipment in working condition was loaned to the club. A schematic for a 40 meter 50 watt CW transmitter caught the attention of one of the club members. A few bucks were collected to buy an appropriate aluminum chassis and the output tube. The other parts

were gathered from the 'boxeso-stuff' of the science department and the local elmers. Soon the club had an operational transmitter with the only casualty during construction being an RF burn from the plate cap. An 80 me-



ter dipole and a vertical antenna resurrected from an elmer's garage made up the antenna compliment.

A good time was had by all. A club license was obtained and the members were on the air as WB2STN. In addition to club meetings, fund raisers and contacts from "The Shack", club members put on demos at the yearly school arts festival, set up a station in the 4-H building at the Chatham Fair and held at least one field day in a hunting shack near the top of Mercer Mountain on the Canaan/ Austerlitz border. The fund raisers led to the purchase of a Lafayette KT-320 receiver and a



Heathkit DX-20 transmitter.

The club's numbers waxed and waned for a few years then unfortunately the club dissolved sometime in the early 1970's. One of the charter members of the club returned to teach science at Chatham, but couldn't interest students of that era in ham radio. The remnants of the ham club turned into a broadcast radio and TV production club. Not necessarily a bad thing because a few of those club members went on to pursue careers in commercial radio and TV broadcasting.

Who were those pioneers of the ham club in the 1960's? WA2ULU (now K2WG), WB2CJQ (now unlicensed), WB2QYZ (now WA3UMY) and WB2YTM. My memory fails as to how many if any others obtained licenses during those years. I think some may have received a Novice ticket but never upgraded. However, the club member with the highest class license at the time was our control operator for whatever activity was underway.
